
History of Lowestoft Town Hall

The town hall is in the heart of Lowestoft and deserves to be rejuvenated to enable it to become the hub of our community.

Timeline for the project

It is an important part of Lowestoft history, which should be preserved for future generations.

pre-1859

A chapel of ease was built on the site in the early to mid fourteenth century, which was incorporated into a market building that was eventually known as the Town House or Chamber. It was rebuilt in 1698.

1859

The 1698 building was demolished and replaced with a new building designed by John Louth Clemence. Samuel Morton Peto donated stained-glass windows by John Thomas. The existing Council Chamber remains from this version of the Town Hall.

– c1870s

The New Market Inn on Compass St was built. It was incorporated into the Town Hall in the 1970s, although is not part of the listing.

- 1899-1900

Widening of the High Street meant much of the previous building was demolished and rebuilt, with only the old Council Chamber retained. The architect was Borough Engineer George Henry Hanby.

1904

Town Hall extended by three bays on Compass Street, also designed by Hanby.

1914

Town Hall extended up to Mariners Street to accommodate committee room, residential accommodation and offices.

1935

Small extension to the 1914 extension on Mariner Street

1970s

New Market Inn incorporated into Town Hall

1993

The Town Hall is listed

- 2015

Waveney District Council moved out of the Town Hall. It has remained unoccupied since.

2017

Lowestoft Town Council was formed and became the owner of the Town Hall

May 2021

Lowestoft Town Council's project team, led by MossKing Associates, submitted a successful first stage funding application to the National Lottery Heritage Fund.

May 2022

Appointed the design team - HAT Projects, Richard Griffiths Architects, Momentum (structural engineering), Max Fordham (building services engineers)

- Maγ 2023

We will submit second stage bid to National Lottery Heritage Fund and apply for planning permission

Nov 2023 (if funded) – delivery stage begins

Apr 2024 – main contractor starts building work

Summer 2025 – Town Hall reopens

The Town Hall is such a beautiful old building. The neglect feels like it's bringing this end of the high street down. Make it right so the town can have some pride in itself.









Why reopen Lowestoft Town Hall?

The Town Hall has been owned by Lowestoft Town Council since 2017. It is currently deteriorating, but if restored it could become an amazing community facility.

Redevelopment of the Town Hall would bring people to the High Street, helping other local shops and businesses. It could also create new jobs for local people, both directly (working in the Town Hall) and indirectly (through supporting other local businesses).

> It's too nice a building to stay empty! That end of town needs an attraction or something worth going up that end for!

It is an amazing building that Lowestoft is lucky to have. At all costs it should be restored to allow public use. It is in a unique place to revitalise the old town.



What you told us before


In January 2021, we asked the people of Lowestoft what they wanted to see in the Town Hall:

- Over 90% came from NR32, NR33 postcodes





The design approach

We need to extend the Town Hall to make space for all the activities that will make it a thriving community hub.

The Town Hall was originally one building within a dense urban block. The back of the Town Hall was never meant to be seen.

We want to use the new extensions to restore this setting by creating a strong frontage along all the streets, and placing a courtyard in the centre of the block.

In creating a courtyard at the heart of the block, the new buildings have less impact on the most significant historic part - the Council Chamber itself.

This also protects the Town Hall from the visual impact of future development proposals that may come forward on the site next door.



Sketch model of Town Hall with new additions



Heritage at the Town Hall

The Town Hall will provide a focal point for celebrating the town's heritage and help support the wonderful local museums.

A dedicated heritage exhibition gallery will tell the history of the town in a vibrant, interactive, inclusive, engaging, and innovative way. It will also incorporate local people's stories captured by our pilot activity 'Your Lowestoft Memories'.

A separate Gallery will have space for a changing programme of temporary exhibitions and events.

People Landscapes and Buildings (PLB) are our museum interpretation specialists, and will work with the Project Team to consult and engage local heritage experts, volunteers, families, schools and communities with the concept designs to inform how the designs develop.
