Training Approach

For 50 years IBTC has delivered internationally renowned, industry leading boatbuilding courses and training for people seeking a career in the industry as well as individuals wanting to develop new and existing interests and skills.

We believe that learning should begin on real projects from day one, focussing on individual needs in order to build confidence and develop skills. Students are of all ages, from teens to retirement, and come from a wide range of backgrounds; this eclectic mix creates a vibrant atmosphere where individuals can share their skills, experiences and dreams.

Based in Lowestoft, IBTC has trained well over a thousand boatbuilders and woodworkers. Students have come to study from around the world; Australia, across Europe, USA, Canada, Kenya, South Africa, Antigua & Barbuda, South Korea, the list is extensive.

After completing their training at IBTC our graduates have gone on to fulfil a comprehensive range of vocational pursuits within boatbuilding. Graduates have set up successful boat yards including **Sterling & Sons**, Southwold-based **Harbour Marine Services** and **Broadland Boatbuilders** in St. Olaves. Graduates have gone on to work in reputable traditional boatyards such as **Tommy Nielsen**, **Hunters**, **Eastwood Whelpton** and **Demon Yachts** as well as luxury yacht producers **Spirit Yachts**, **Princess Yachts** and **Oyster Yachts**.

At IBTC our teaching programmes not only equip graduates with the essential knowledge and skills needed for boatbuilding but have been shown to benefit people who have struggled with mainstream education. Our programmes help people build confidence and develop a self belief through finding previously undiscovered talents and skills. This is also true of people who have suffered from the myriad of mental health problems we see in the modern world. From the ex-service person with PTSD to the young person with anxiety issues, we have discovered that focussing on high quality traditional training has the welcome side effect of improving one's mental health.

The legacy of IBTC and its contribution to the marine sector is one that we are extremely proud of. Quality is paramount in the training that we offer, so we don't take shortcuts. In a time of well publicised skill shortages in the UK, it is essential that we do not allow quality skills to be diluted or disappear. The training must be accessible for people to learn. We are taking the next steps to secure the future of IBTC, ensuring we can continue to deliver the best education to those who wish to learn about the rewarding and affirming world of boatbuilding and traditional joinery.
