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Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 March 2023

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2023. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

Introduction and Highlights

The landmark of the year was the appointment and arrival in October 2022 of new Artistic Director arrival came a re-articulation of HighTide's artistic mission, vision and values. From 2023 onwards these are now articulated as:

Our artistic mission, HighTide is a writer-centred theatre company, based in the East of England. We produce new plays by playwrights from our region, touring across the East and beyond. We run a year-round writer development programme that creates space for East of England playwrights to thrive. We offer creative writing programmes in schools and community groups to build confidence, welcoming and employability.

We are committed to ensuring everyone, from all backgrounds, can participate in the joy and power of theatre. We believe that partnership and collaboration makes better theatre, as well as more lasting, positive social change.

HighTide holds the climate crisis in its name; a daily reminder of our responsibility to act now - with imagination and creativity. We see climate and social justice as inextricably linked and believe that theatre can help rehearse a better future for us all.

- our successful reapplication to Arts Council England's National Portfolio, with a funding decision given in November 2022 that we would continue to be core funded as an NPO throughout 23-26.

ARTISTIC ACTIVITIES Productions

Kabul Goes Pop by Waleed Akhtar

Kabul Goes Pop by Waleed Akhtar, directed by rising star of British theatre Anna Himali Howard was presented with Brixton House in association with Mercury Theatre Colchester. Kabul Goes Pop was first presented at the Mercury Theatre as part of Mercury Reads in early 2021 and was then part of our Inventing the Future Festival in 21/22. We were delighted to be able to give it a full production life in 22/23. Our production received critical acclaim in London, with the run in Brixton extending due to demand before touring across the East of England (New Wolsey Theatre, Harlow Playhouse, Mercury Colchester). The production was nominated for two Offie awards: Most Promising New Playwright and Lead Performance in a Play.

Akhtar then went on to win an Outstanding Achievement Olivier Award for his next production. We are proud to have helped launch him as a writer of real significance.

The Lies You Tell by Yolanda Mercy

This brand-new, music-filled play encouraged young people to speak up, and speak out, about their mental health and well-being following the disruptions of the pandemic. Aimed at young people aged 10 to 12 and commissioned for schools by Suffolk County Council and in partnership with MIND, The Lies You Tell was written by Yolanda Mercy, directed by Nathan Powell and produced by HighTide Theatre with New Wolsey Theatre Ipswich and Theatre Royal Bury St Edmunds. 6748 school children saw this energetic and engaging piece and we hope to roll out this successful model again in the future.

Artist Development

HighTide remained committed to supporting new work and artists in 22/23.

Commissioning:

HighTide partnered with the Writers Guild of Great Britain (WGGB), UK Theatre and the Independent Theatre Council (ITC) on the New Play Commission Scheme to ensure 15 new commissions for playwrights across England in 2022/23, in response to the decline in new theatre commissions during the Covid-19 pandemic.

New AD seed-commissioned four plays for sharing at HighTide Rising (May 2023). The four playwrights chosen for this strand of work, Tassa Deparis, Guleraana Mir, Eloise Pennycott and Tom Ratcliffe all come from or live in the East of England.

She also commissioned three further playwrights and a composer - again all from the East of England - for Ghost Stories By Candlelight. Kelly Jones, Georgia Shackleton, Shamser Sinha, and Nicola Werenowska's piece will tour in autumn 2023.

R&D:

- a workshop of Debris Stevenson's HighTide commission about 18th century Suffolk feminist, Margaret Catchpole, called Becoming MC, was held in partnership (and funded by) the drama school LAMDA. It was directed by Blythe Stewart.
- a reading of Ben Weatherill's commission about Benjamin Britten, called Silver Darlings, was held at Britten's
 actual home, the Red House near Aldeburgh, in his music room. It was an electric evening proving the promise
 of this material. It was directed by Scott Hurran.

New writer development focus:

Two East of England 'Playwright Gatherings' were held, both in person and online. These were led in partnership with Improbable Theatre and invited 80 East of England playwrights to examine the concerns and issues facing playwrights in the east and how HighTide could work with them. This thinking has led to the creation of Playwrights East, HighTide's new focus of writer development from 2023 onwards.

Engagement

Latitude Festival

During the exhibitanting Latitude Festival weekend, we collaborated with the creative content management agency, Creative Nation, to deliver a series of workshops for young people. These workshops were led by Essex-based artist Anne Odeke and Norfolk-based artist Sadie Clark.

Herring Girls: greater than we are alone by Jessie Maryon Davies and Hannah Jane Walker

22/23 saw the first 6 months of development of this beautiful, choral community participation piece, seeing deep engagement in the key areas of Lowestoft and Great Yarmouth. Five consultation sessions were held to meet choirs in the area and discuss the project. Workshops were then held with choirs including: Britten Pears Arts' Group A Choir', the Seagull Theatre, Lowestoft's Rogue Shanty Choir, Kirkley Community Choir, Beccles Community Choir, and St George's Theatre Choir Yarmouth. Following sign up by choristers, workshops were then led by Musical Director and Composer Jessie Maryon Davies and Essex-based librettist Hannah Jane Walker to generate material for the final book and composition: a unique song cycle celebrating the inspiring legacy of the herring girls' protest over fair pay in Lowestoft in 1936.

From this first stage of co-creation, we received some wonderful feedback from our participants, including:

'I love how enthusiastic, warm and welcoming you all are. I've really enjoyed both nights so far.'

And

'Everyone seems very kind, enthusiastic and committed, I think it's going to be a lovely thing to be a part of.'

Herring Girls... was later brought to life in June 2023, made in partnership with First Light Festival, Britten Pears Arts and the Seagull Theatre in Lowestoft.

SECTOR LEADERSHIP

Anti-Racism Touring Rider

Work on the Anti-Racism Touring Rider continued in 22/23 to establish the baseline of expectations between companies, venues and artists on a touring production. HighTide senior management was key in continuing the consultation process with organisations and freelancers across the country feeding into the process for both rider and accompanying checklist, offering a series of actions for anti-racist practice and giving a framework for discussion and support before and during a tour.

Creative Climate Leadership Programme Out of over 100 applicants from arts and cultural professionals, HighTide new AD was invited to join Julie Bicycle's Creative Climate Leadership Programme, an international training and transformation programme to empower artists and cultural professionals to take action on the climate and ecological crisis with impact, creativity, and resilience. Since arrival, HighTide has a deepened commitment to climate careful practices and this course set in motion some exciting new ideas for driving change in the future. STRATEGIC REPORT The 22-23 financial year had a closing cash balance of £161,691 (2022: £166,245), accruals £22,500 (2022: 43,888). The closing reserves position will be £159,887 (2022: £127,351), taking the position above the 6-month running costs of the following financial year 23-24, with a healthy financial position going forward. An accrual of £15,000 for the 2023-24 is included within the closing reserves position, representing underspend on a project due to take place in Q1 of 23-24

HighTide is exceptionally grateful to its investors, including Arts Council England through National Portfolio Organisation funding, Lansons, Esmee Fairbairn Foundation and the many trusts and foundations, businesses and individuals who contribute their energy and investment to HighTide. The trustees extend their sincere thanks and gratitude for this support.

. This expenditure will be satisfied in quarter one of the 2022-23 financial year.

Staffing

Starting
This year saw a number of significant staffing changes, positioning HighTide well for its new artistic mission adding fresh voices, ideas and perspectives from the region:
Executive Director was on maternity leave until August 2022 and her role was covered by ensuring continuity of leadership and management across the organisation. The Chair & Trustees thank for her hard work & commitment to HighTide, especially during the pandemic period.
Following the resignation of Artistic Director towards the end of 21/22, an extensive recruitment process for a new AD resulted in the appointment of which was previously Head of New Work at London's Donmar Warehouse.
Executive Director, was sadly but excitingly recruited to become CEO of the City of London Sinfonia. A wide and fruitful search for a new ED and Joint CEO began and previously Chief Executive of Marina Theatre in Lowestoft, joined the company in June 2023. Having lived and worked in the east since 2004, appointment helps to cement HighTide's commitment to the East of England.
Director of Development and Communications left the company after 14 brilliant years in March 2023, triggering a productive staffing restructure to drive the new artistic mission of the company for 2023 and beyond. The Chair & Trustees thank for her hard work, long service & dedication to HighTide.
2022/23 saw the appointment of a new Associate Artist and HighTide - and our industry's first Climate Dramaturg -
Colchester-based joined HighTide as a Peggy Ramsey Foundation/Film 4 Awards Scheme Playwright on placement for one year.

HighTide appointed		is based in Suffolk, and is an experienced producer of
hyper-local touring: a new a	rtistic model of investigation for H	ighTide in 2023 and beyond.

The company's new Advisory Council was cemented, made up of major donors, present and past Board Members, key staff, and development professionals. It complements the Board's work on fundraising and advocacy.

Freelance Workforce

This year the company worked with 38 freelancers who represented a broad range of characteristics (of those who returned an Equal Opportunities Form):

- -19% of whom were identified as being from the global majority
- -10% of whom identified as LGBTQ+
- -13.5% of whom identified as Neurodiverse
- -16.2% of whom identified as Disabled

Trustees

22/23 saw one Board retirement in The Chair and Trustees thank for her 7 years of brilliant dedication to the company.

New Trustee appointments were:

- Chief Executive of the New Wolsey Theatre in Ipswich 2000-2022, is now a freelance Consultant whose portfolio includes working with Ramps on the Moon, an initiative to normalise the inclusion of disabled people in all aspects of the theatre industry.

- Head of Trusts and Foundations at the British Library, leading on capital and revenue fundraising and strategy for trusts and foundations. was previously Head of Trusts at the National Theatre.

Operation Indicators

Despite it being a year of transitions, the majority of KPIs were exceeded or very close to met. For example:

- -There was a target of 5000 audience in the East of England, we achieved 9081 and were 182% of target
- -A target of 2 EoE playwright commissions was set, this target was exceeded by the commissioning of 5 playwrights from the region which saw us at 250% of target
- -We doubled our target of 2 of working with playwrights from backgrounds with protected characteristics
- -A target of 5 collaborative developmental relationships with EoE producing partners was set and we were able to double this at over 200% of target.

Whilst there was less production output this year (due to our Artistic Director transition) we certainly enjoyed an increase in engagement work through The Lies You Tell schools tour which was seen by approximately 6,748 students and the development of Herring Girls: greater than we are alone which engaged with numerous community and school choirs in and around Lowestoft. Extensive artistic plans for 2023/24 & 2024/25 are already well underway.

HighTide's office at the New Wolsey Theatre continues to further embed the company in the East of England, helping us to engage with more of our target audiences.

Our sector-leading and diverse pool of Associate Artists in 22/23 informed the ambition, quality and dynamism of our offer. And our refreshed Board, which now includes further key arts leaders based and working within the East of England, helped guide the strategic direction and ensure the impact of our work as a whole.

FUTURE PLANS 2023/24

Strategic Plan for 2023-26

In early 23/24, to support the new artistic mission and under the Executive Leadership team, we're crafting a refreshed Strategic Plan for 2023-26. This is being developed with the Board of Trustees and will also look ahead to realising our vision statements for 2030 too.

Artistic Activities

Community

Herring Girls: greater than we are alone, June 2023 - this show-stopping community choir piece, referenced above and the culmination of months of deep co-creating work across Lowestoft in 22/23, was the first act on the mainstage at First Light Festival. It was performed by 45, 8 to 80 year olds, with a four piece band, to a huge, singalong crowd.

Writer Development

HighTide Rising, May 2023 - signalling our new mission to develop and platform East of England playwrights, this was a one day play reading festival held at Wingfield Barns, Suffolk. Our writers were Tassa Deparis, Guleraana Mir, Eloise Pennycott and Tom Ratcliffe. Readings were directed by Yasmin Hafesji and Beth Kapila. Co-hosted by leading playwrights and East Anglian residents Juliet Gilkes Romero and Lucy Kirkwood. It was part of a new strategic partnership between HighTide and UEA.

Playwrights East - following the Playwrights Gatherings in March, in May 2023 we established a new development network for aspiring and established playwrights from the East, called Playwrights East. The first year is being generously funded by the Foyle Foundation.

Productions

Ghost Stories By Candlelight, Oct-Nov 2023 - a candlelit evening of chilling, contemporary tales and haunting new folk music written by East Anglian writers Kelly Jones, Shamser Sinha and Nicola Werenowska, with music and songs composed by Georgia Shackleton. Directed by Elayce Ismail. (Made in association with Theatre Royal Bury St Edmunds, Harlow Playhouse and Shakespeare's Globe.) Ghosts Stories pilots a new model of touring for HighTide, combining major venues in the East alongside hyper-local community spaces like pubs, museums and village halls, before transferring to the Sam Wanamaker Playhouse at the Globe. The community touring model is being funded by an Arts Council England National Lottery Project Grant.

Environmental Action 23/24

As a key new tenet of our artistic mission, we're overhauling our Environmental Policy and Action Plan in 23/24, to integrate our new artistic practice of climate dramaturgy and leading us towards decarbonisation by 2030. This is being supported by a Knowledge Exchange Fellowship, funded by Cambridge University, with our Associate Artist,

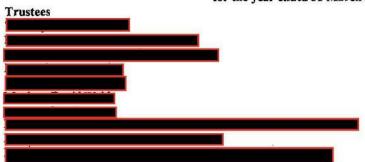

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of HighTide Festival Productions Limited (the 'charitable company') for the year ended 31 March 2023 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Statement of Financial Position and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

In our opinion the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the state of the charitable company's affairs as at 31 March 2023 and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including its income and expenditure, for the year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice; and
- have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006.

Basis for opinion

Matters on which we are required to report by exception

In the light of the knowledge and understanding of the charitable company and its environment obtained in the course of the audit, we have not identified material misstatements in the Report of the Trustees.

We have nothing to report in respect of the following matters where the Companies Act 2006 requires us to report to you if, in our opinion:

- adequate accounting records have not been kept or returns adequate for our audit have not been received from branches not visited by us; or
- the financial statements are not in agreement with the accounting records and returns; or
- certain disclosures of trustees' remuneration specified by law are not made; or
- we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit; or
- the trustees were not entitled to take advantage of the small companies exemption from the requirement to prepare a Strategic Report or in preparing the Report of the Trustees.

Responsibilities of trustees

As explained more fully in the Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities, the trustees (who are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view, and for such internal control as the trustees determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the trustees are responsible for assessing the charitable company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the trustees either intend to liquidate the charitable company or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Our responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue a Report of the Independent Auditors that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (UK) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

The extent to which our procedures are capable of detecting irregularities, including fraud is detailed below:

In identifying and assessing risks of material misstatement in respect of irregularities, including fraud and non-compliance with laws and regulations, we considered the following:

- o the nature of the industry and sector, control environment and business performance including the design of the Company's remuneration policies, key drivers for directors' remuneration, bonus levels and performance targets;
- o results of our enquiries of management about their own identification and assessment of the risks of irregularities;
- o any matters we identified having obtained and reviewed the Company's documentation of their policies and procedures relating to:- identifying, evaluating and complying with laws and regulations and whether they were aware of any instances of noncompliance;- detecting and responding to the risks of fraud and whether they have knowledge of any actual, suspected or alleged fraud;- the internal controls established to mitigate risks of fraud or non-compliance with laws and regulations;
- o the matters discussed among the audit engagement team and involving relevant internal specialists, including tax and IT specialists regarding how and where fraud might occur in the financial statements and any potential indicators of fraud.
- As a result of these procedures, we considered the opportunities and incentives that may exist within the organisation for fraud and identified the greatest potential for fraud in relation to revenue deferrals. In common with all audits under ISAs (UK), we are also required to perform specific procedures to respond to the risk of management override.
- o We also obtained an understanding of the legal and regulatory frameworks that the Company operates in, focusing on provisions of those laws and regulations that had a direct effect on the determination of material amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The key laws and regulations we considered in this context included the UK Companies Act and local tax legislation.

In addition, we considered provisions of other laws and regulations that do not have a direct effect on the financial statements but compliance with which may be fundamental to the Company's ability to operate or to avoid a material penalty.

Audit responses to the risks identified

Our procedures to respond to risks identified included the following:

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The charitable company has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Government Grants

The Charity is an Arts Council England national portfolio organisation. As a result of this status they received £195,179 (2022: £237,188) in grants from this governmental funded organisation.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

In accordance with the charity SORP, HighTide allocates costs incurred directly from undertaking activities that contribute towards our charitable objectives to charitable activity expenditure.

The support costs of the charity are allocated to each charitable activity based on the amount of time spent on each activity.

Tangible fixed assets

Property, plant and equipment are carried at cost less accumulated depreciation.

Property, plant and equipment is initially measured at cost. Cost includes all expenditure which is directly attributable to the acquisition or construction of the asset, including capitalisation of borrowing costs on qualifying assets, and adjustments in respect of hedge accounting, where appropriate.

Depreciation is charged over the useful lives of items of property, plant and equipment have been assessed as follows:

The residual value, useful life and depreciation method of each asset are reviewed at the end of each reporting year. If the expectations differ from previous estimates, the change is accounted for prospectively as a change in accounting estimate. The depreciation charge for each year is recognised in the profit or loss account.

Tangible fixed assets

Impairment tests are performed on property, plant and equipment when there is an indicator that they may be impaired. When the carrying amount of an item of property, plant and equipment is assessed to be higher than the estimated recoverable amount, an impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss. An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected. Any gain or loss arising from the derecognition is included in profit or loss.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.
